Ma Bessie's Prohibition Party



The Gaol on the Bridge A fascinated history article from Keith Jagger

St. John the Baptist's Chantry used to sit on the end of the old Appleby Bridge on the opposite side of the road to where the Kings Head stands. Reformation suppressed the Chantry's use and the chapel building became the town's gaol, this was in place of one housed in the castle. The gaol fell into disrepair in 1714 and was condemned much later in 1761, a good example of Appleby's timely decision making! A house replaced it and this too was lost as the entrance to the new bridge (known as St.Lawrence's Bridge) was widened in 1889 replacing the old Norman bridge which was then considered unsafe.

*In 1888 demolition began and in the same year the foundation stone of the central pier of the new bridge was laid. In the demolition, so the story runs, a bottle of antique form was discovered among the foundations, and this appeared to contain a piece of parchment. It was thrown by the

workman finding it to the foreman on the bank; he failed to catch it and it fell back into the river and was lost.

The new bridge is built of red and grey sandstone in the Georgian style. It has two segmental arches flanked by three-sided cutwaters with quarter foiled Gothic circles in the spandrels. This grade II listed building shares its name with the adjacent church. The gaol on the bridge saw many prisoners ranging from petty thieves to political activists. More serious criminals would most certainly have preferred a custodial sentence against being hanged on Gallows Hill. Amongst the political activists held here were the Quakers of the 1660s, notably Francis Howgill and James Nayler, two of George Fox's "Valiant Sixty" and founders of the Quaker Religious Society of Friends. Howgill came from Grayrigg (then called Gray Ridge), on the Appleby to Kendal road

and was responsible for bringing Fox to Firbank for his famous preaching to thousands of Westmorland Seekers in 1652. Francis Howgill was jailed in his own beloved county for refusing to swear allegiance to King Charles 11 and was incarcerated in Royalist Appleby. The Rev. Will Hayes writes in his biography of Francis Howgill:

Francis Howgill never saw Gray Ridge again with his mortal eyes. He died in Appleby Gaol – his first prison and his last – four years later; i.e. in 1668. These four years were really busy years, as we gather from Howgill's writings. The prisoner made many friends. Even his gaoler became his friend before the end. And the Mayor of Appleby and other persons of note were among his visitors. And from Appleby Francis Howgill sent letters to Quakers. These are preserved in his writings. They are chiefly letters to the persecuted and the imprisoned. One of the last of them is addressed: "From Appleby Gaol, the place of my rest, where the days and hours are pleasant unto me."

Next to the bridge stands The King's Head which looks like it has seen better days and it has. The 1890 guidebook to the town features a full-page advert for the hotel and boasts its being "The

only hotel in the town with hot and cold baths" and proclaims that "The hotel omnibus awaits the arrival of all trains" and welcomes "Tourists, Visitors and Commercial Men visiting Appleby. They will find every Accommodation and Comforts of Home at the old established Family Hotel and Posting House".

Broadband for Murton Parish from B4RN, the 'Best Internet Provider 2022'

Superfast broadband is coming – there has been enough interest to secure the UK funding & allow B4RN planners to start planning the route.

How? - Using field edges & green spaces, a vibrating mole cutter to bury the cables and local contractors to lay them right to your home. Your individual cable offers 1000mb download/upload speed so that is the minimum B4RN offers (& no sharing!)

When? – Hopefully completed by the end of 2023. We'll know more when the land surveys are completed and the route finalised.

Where? – Starting in Coupland Beck, to Brackenber, Hilton, Murton, Harbour Flatt, Flakebridge, and Langton, ending at Well House.

What? – Those who sign up will be fitted with a small grey box on the house external wall and a master socket on the internal wall for the 1000mb router. The B4RN surveyor will talk to each householder about the siting of the cable & the box, and specialist staff can advise on individual needs at installation & set-up. B4RN offer a VOIP telephone service @£9 pm if you want a landline service.**

How much will it cost? – B4RN has formulated a business plan which has been accepted for UK Government funding through their broadband voucher scheme. It is anticipated this will allow the maximum available funding for a scheme of our size, a set amount which should cover <u>at least</u> 70% of the total costs. The total build cost will be matched against the money awarded. Then we'll know what the shortfall will be. The balance will be covered by investment through the B4RN Share purchase scheme. **

INVESTMENT in Broadband for the Rural North: investment is between £100 and £100,000; invest £1500 before you go live and save the £60 connection fee. Shares are held for a minimum of 3 years & offer an annual return of **5%**. If you are interested, please speak to one of the volunteers for further details or Email **shareregistrar@b4rn.org.uk**.

What will it cost me?:

One-off connection fee - £60.00 (charged monthly @£5.00) Monthly subscription fee - £33.00 **B4RN** offers a social tariff of £15.00 pm + connection fee to those who qualify. ** For those in a broadband contract which has some time before it expires, B4RN offers a scheme called

Connect Plus. 2 options are available:

1. Connect to B4RN straightaway at a cost of £5 pm while paying your current broadband provider until the contract ends – limited to 12 months

2. Delay the connection, where the current contract has 12 months to run and then sign up to Connect Plus.

This issue I've been sent the most delicious *Easter Egg Rocky Road* by **Ned**...already made for me to taste! Luckily this budding chef also sent a recipe so you can dive into chocolatey heaven too!

Easter Egg Rocky Road

Ingredients

200g dark chocolate (chopped) 200g milk chocolate (chopped) 50g butter 1 tablespoon golden syrup 100g Rich Tea biscuits (broken into small pieces) 2 Crunchie bars (chopped) 100g mini marshmallows 40 mini eggs (we used a selection of Cadburys mini eggs, Lindor, Smarties eggs, Milky Bar eggs)



Method

1.Line a 22cm square tin. 2.Melt the chocolate, butter and syrup in a heatproof bowl over a pan of simmering water.



3.Stir in the biscuits, marshmallows and Crunchie bits.

4. Tip the chocolate mix into the tin and level out as much as possible.

5.Push the mini eggs down into the surface.6.Put in the fridge to set for at least 3 hours or overnight.

7.Cut into squares.

If you do not have any mini eggs, you can use any small chocolatey treats like Maltesers.


St John's Church An update from Dave Sampson

Paul's Everest Base Camp Trek

Back in February this year the Fellsiders hosted a fantastic guest speaker, **Paul McDowell**, who shared with us his trekking adventure to Everest Base Camp raising money for **MND**. His beautiful photographs, which have since been exhibited at the Warcop Art Exhibition, really captured the stunning landscape and were a super visual aid to those of us who find Murton Pike a bit of an adventure! If you missed it, here's an extremely condensed version from Paul...



'I set off on my Trek on the 13th November 2022, flying into Lukla, described as the most dangerous airport in the world!

The trek would take 8 days there and 4 days back walking <u>7-8 hours</u> a day and covering 130km in total. I summited Everest Base Camp so to speak on 21st November 2022 at 2.40pm at an elevation off 5364 metres. I was raising for Motor Neurone Disease and reached a total of £4501.23'

Murton Parish Council Report 5th April 2023

There have been two meetings since the last Villager,

The Parish Council Meeting on 6th February 2023 and **The Annual Parish Meeting of Murton Parish Council** on 6th March 2023.

Matters arising from the 6th February Parish Council meeting were:-

Village Litter Pick

This took place on 20th March 12 volunteers braved the drizzly weather and did a sterling job of collecting 20 bags of litter. My thanks to all for helping to keep our Parish tidy.

Parish Council Electronic Mailing List - Reminder The information on how to join the PC mailing list had been circulated. Cemetery Mowing

The PC had advertised and circulated information asking for quotations for mowing the cemetery. We decided to accept the quotation from the Penrith-based charity *Fixit4Eden, Steve Roberts a Fix it Team leader lives in Hilton and manages a team of* people with learning disabilities.

Elections

All Murton parish council seats were up for election this year. This means the current Councillors stood down and had to be renominated if they wish to stand again. Six nominations for seven seats on the Parish Council were submitted. This is therefore considered to be an uncontested election. This means that the Parish Council has the option to co-opt a seventh Councillor. Details of how the process for co-option will be available after the next PC meeting. Council Elections due to take place on 4th May will now not take place.

Matters Arising from the Annual Parish Meeting were:-

Westmorland and Furness Council

New Local Councillors Andy Connell and Graham Simpkins came to the meeting to answer questions about the new authority. The following comments and issues were raised:

Q) Murton gets more visitors than might be thought – poor road markings are a significant issue, particularly where cyclists are involved.

A) Poor road markings Government funds not sufficient for all needs.

Q) Highways – potholes are a huge problem not helped by the Cumbrian weather. Murton roads are not a priority, busier roads are prioritised.

A) Faults on the current CCC electronic Fault Reporting System will transfer to the new authority. Residents are encouraged to use this system themselves.

Q) Council Tax – levelling up - there is a bigger increase for Eden residents than those living in Barrow as their Council Tax was already higher than Eden's.

A) The difference in levels of services were commented on despite the same Council Tax rate: buses are not subsidised and only run where they are commercially viable; gritting is prioritised where there is a higher volume of traffic

Both new councils have inherited debt. Officers will be based at Voreda House in Penrith. This has been upgraded and is fit for a modern council base in Eden. The alternative could have been services being delivered from Kendal.

To summarise, there would be a transition phase where existing systems would be reviewed, aligned and some new developed. Graham and Andy aim to be working hard for residents in the Brough and Appleby ward.

B4RN - Super fast (1000mb) Broadband

David Ryall described B4RN, a community-led, Community Benefit Society installing full fibre broadband speeds to hard-to-reach rural areas. Key points include:

- B4RN can provide full fibre broadband speeds of 1000mbps for around £33 per month, plus a £60 connection fee.
- They are a not-for-profit company, which accesses Government funding for extending broadband in rural areas, in order to develop the service.

- They are based in Kirkby Lonsdale and develop projects with communities. They are currently working in Warcop. They would like to work with Murton.

- It takes about a year from initial meetings with a community to all those who have signed up to be connected.
 - The planning team works with landowners and residents to lay cables across fields and to individual houses.
 - Most outages are dealt with immediately and fixed within 24 hours at no cost.
- Current broadband provider contracts can be run alongside B4RN at a minimal charge until the switch to B4RN.
- A public meeting was held to help residents find out more. A show of hands in the room was unanimously in support of taking this project forward.

Upper Eden Linking Lives.

A much needed befriending scheme addressing the problem of loneliness in our community

The problem of loneliness has increased since the pandemic with 3.7 million people in the UK (7.2%) stating that they were chronically lonely or felt lonely often or always. Over the past year the churches in Kirkby Stephen and Appleby have been working together to set up a befriending



scheme in the area to try to help address this issue. The model involves recruiting volunteer befrienders who meet regularly with people experiencing loneliness. This is usually weekly and can be face to face or on the phone. The national charity Linking Lives UK has been helping us to set up our scheme and we have also been supported by the three other schemes currently operating in North Cumbria.

During the past year we have registered ourselves as a new charity

which is being overseen by a team of experienced trustees. One of the essential requirements of a successful scheme is to recruit a coordinator who trains and supports the volunteers as well as matches scheme friends with the volunteers. Covering the salary costs has been the main focus for our fundraising efforts and we are delighted to say that we are well over halfway to meeting our target for year one. We are extremely grateful for support from Cumbria Community Foundation, The Hadrian Trust, Benefact Trust and the Methodist District.

We are hoping that we will be able to recruit a coordinator in late spring and launch our scheme in summer 2023. We would like people in our community to consider whether they might be able to help as a volunteer befriender. This will require about 1-2 hours each week and we suggest an initial commitment of 6-12 months. There will be training and ongoing support from our coordinator but the experience of volunteers from other schemes is that this work can be enormously rewarding. Please consider whether this is something that you might be able to contribute to. Our aim is to be helping 20 lonely people in Upper Eden by the end of our first year.


